In 2019, Ohio negotiated OneOhio, a state-local government allocation agreement regarding opioid settlements. Ohio Attorney General Dave Yost, along with attorneys from some of the other municipalities, has reached a Proposed Settlement with McKesson, Amerisource Bergen and Cardinal Health.

The terms of the proposed settlement provide that the Distributors will pay up to \$804,865,429 to the State of Ohio and its subdivisions over 18 years. Participation levels (the percentage of Ohio cities and counties who agree to the deal) ultimately determine how much money the State of Ohio and its subdivisions will receive.

The estimated allocation amount to the City of Sylvania ranges from \$74,357.07 - \$106,081.53 paid over a period of 18 years and depending on the participation level and incentive payments the State receives. These funds are required to be used for opioid remediation efforts in the City and includes education, intervention, treatment and recovery services.

We recommend approving the Memorandum of Understanding with OneOhio to allow the City to participate in the proposed settlement. Please contact me if you have any questions.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>56</u> -2021

AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND DIRECTOR OF FINANCE TO ENTER INTO A MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING, ON BEHALF OF THE CITY OF SYLVANIA, WITH ONE OHIO CONSISTENT WITH THE TERMS OF THE JULY 21, 2021 NATIONAL OPIOID SETTLEMENT AGREEMENT; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the City of Sylvania (herein "Municipality") is a municipal corporation formed and organized pursuant to the Constitution and laws of the State of Ohio; and,

WHEREAS, the people of the State of Ohio and its communities have been harmed by malfeasance, nonfeasance, and misfeasance committed by certain entities within the Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Ohio, through its Attorney General, and certain Local Governments, through their elected representatives and counsel, are separately engaged in litigation seeking to hold Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants accountable for the damage caused by their misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance; and,

WHEREAS, the State of Ohio, through its Governor and Attorney General, and its Local Governments share a common desire to abate and alleviate the impacts of that misfeasance, nonfeasance and malfeasance throughout the State of Ohio; and,

WHEREAS, the State and its Local Governments, subject to completing formal documents effectuating the Parties Agreements, have drafted and Sylvania, by and through its Council and this Ordinance, reaffirms its adoption of a OneOhio Memorandum of Understanding ("MOU") relating to the allocation and the use of the proceeds of any potential settlements described; and,

WHEREAS, the MOU has been collaboratively drafted to maintain all individual claims while allowing the State and Local Governments to cooperate in exploring all possible means of resolution; and,

WHEREAS, the Council understands that an additional purpose of the MOU is to create an effective means of distributing any potential settlement funds obtained under the MOU between the State of Ohio and Local Governments in a manner and means that would promote an effective and meaningful use of the funds in abating the opioid epidemic throughout Ohio, as well as to permit collaboration and explore potentially earlier resolution of the Opioid Litigation against Opioid Pharmaceutical Supply Chain Participants; and,

WHEREAS, nothing in the MOU binds any party to a specific outcome, but rather, any resolution under the MOU requires acceptance by the State of Ohio and the Local Governments; and,

WHEREAS, a settlement proposal is being presented to the State of Ohio and Local Governments by distributors Amerisource Bergen, Cardinal, and McKesson (collectively the "Settling Distributors") to resolve governmental entity claims in the State of Ohio using the structure of the OneOhio MOU and consistent with the material terms of the July 21, 2021 proposed National Opioid Distributor Settlement Agreement; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Law, by report dated August 13, 2021, has recommended approval of the Memorandum of Understanding between the City of Sylvania and OneOhio, a copy of which is attached hereto as "Exhibit A."

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Director of Finance be, and they hereby are, authorized to accept the Proposed Settlement on behalf of the City of Sylvania, pursuant to the terms of the OneOhio MOU as set forth on the attached "Exhibit A."

SECTION 2. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 3. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Ordinance in the Office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12, of the Charter of this City.

SECTION 4. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, property and welfare and for the further reason that the MOU should be approved at the earliest possible time so that the City can participate in the National Opioid Settlement through OneOhio. Provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days after it is approved by the Mayor or as otherwise provided by the Charter.

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

In May 2021, the City wrapped up construction of the Harroun Park River Trail Stream Restoration Project located in Tenmile Creek between Main Street and the pedestrian bridge in Harroun Park. This project targeted sediment and nutrient reduction by improving eroded streambank conditions. A major component of the project included placing two in-stream rock structures to divert flow away from the streambank edges (called J-Hooks) and subsequently rehabilitating and reinforcing 300 feet of streambank. The \$240,000 project was funded by a \$216,020 non-competitive subgrant through the Ohio Lake Erie Commission and Great Lakes Restoration Initiative (GLRI).

The Ohio Environmental Protection Agency (OEPA) is interested in submitting a handful of projects for funding consideration in the August 2021 solicitation in the competitive portion of the GLRI Program. The Service Department would like for the OEPA to consider an extension of the 2021 project which would be located east of the pedestrian bridge (where Tenmile Creek becomes the Ottawa River) and west of Harroun Road. This extension project would restore 1,000 feet of streambank and install six (6) J-Hook structures placed at 200-foot intervals. Other project components include six (6) constructed riffles and 700 feet of toewood for streambank reinforcement.

The total cost of the project is anticipated to be \$702,000 and the City would be applying for the GLRI funding cap max of \$600,000. The remaining \$102,000 would be locally funded as a 2022 budgeted item. We request authorization to apply for GLRI funding for this extension project. Please call with any questions.

RESOLUTION NO. <u>9</u> -2021

A RESOLUTION AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND DIRECTOR OF FINANCE TO PREPARE AND SUBMIT AN APPLICATION TO THE OHIO ENVIRONMENTAL PROTECTION AGENCY FOR A GREAT LAKES RESTORATION INITIATIVE SUBGRANT FOR THE HARROUN PARK RIVER TRAIL STREAM RESOTRATION PROJECT; TO EXECUTE CONTRACTS AS REQUIRED; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, in May, 2021, the City finalized the Harroun Park River Trail Stream

Restoration Project located in Ten Mile Creek between Main Street and the pedestrian bridge in Harroun Park; and,

WHEREAS, that project targeted sediment and nutrient reduction by improving eroded streambank conditions and \$216,000 of the \$240,000 project cost was funded by a non-competitive subgrant through the Ohio Lake Erie Commission and Great Lakes Restoration Initiative; and,

WHEREAS, the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency ("OEPA") is interested in submitting a handful of projects for funding consideration in the competitive portion of the Great Lakes Restoration Initiative ("GLRI") Program; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated August 16, 2021, has recommended the OEPA consider an extension of the 2021 project which would be located east of the pedestrian bridge (where Ten Mile Creek becomes the Ottawa River) and west of Harroun Road; and,

WHEREAS, this project would restore 1,000 feet of streambank and install six (6) J-Hook structures placed at 200-foot intervals as well as constructing six (6) riffles and 700 feet of toewood for streambank reinforcement; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, in a report dated August 16, 2021, indicated that the total estimated cost of the project is \$702,000 and the City is requesting \$600,000 in GLRI funding, for a total estimated cost to the City of \$102,000 which would be included in the 2022 budget.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT RESOLVED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

- <u>SECTION 1.</u> That the Mayor and Director of Finance be, and they hereby are, authorized to apply to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency for a Great Lakes Restoration Initiative Subgrant for funds as described above.
- SECTION 2. The Mayor and Director of Finance are further authorized to enter into any agreements as may be necessary and appropriate for obtaining this financial assistance.
- SECTION 3. If the Harroun Park River Trail Stream Restoration Extension Project is approved for financial assistance, the City of Sylvania will commit the necessary funds to meet the local share as indicated in the corresponding project application and will enter into an agreement with the OEPA/GLRI for the grant.
- SECTION 4. It is hereby found and determined that for all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Resolution were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.
- SECTION 5. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Resolution in the office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12 of the Charter of this City.
- SECTION 6. Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

The Ohio Department of Transportation (ODOT) has completed their negotiations and reached an Agreement with ARCADIS US, Inc. to provide engineering design services on the LUC-US-23-11.75 (PID 105889) project in the amount of \$3,174,596. The Agreement contains thirteen (13) scope of services parts and will lead the project from preliminary engineering through bidding.

In 2019 and 2020, the City successfully secured Congestion Mitigation and Air Quality (CMAQ), Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP), and Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funds to pay for portions of the engineering and construction phases. Specifically, \$289,271.20 of CMAQ, \$2,037,232 of HSIP, and \$620,620 of STBG funds are being applied towards the engineering phases of the project. The remaining balances of those awarded funds will be applied towards construction.

The remaining engineering balance of \$227,472.80 is the local participation match amount based on the various program requirements. These funds were an anticipated expense and included in our 2021 Capital Improvement budget. Funds are to be appropriated from account 401-7610-53503.

We would recommend approval of the appropriation of funds as requested by ODOT.

That the State and the Consultant, for the mutual considerations herein contained and specified, have agreed and do hereby agree as follows:

CLAUSE I - WORK DESCRIPTION

The Consultant agrees to perform all professional services as may be authorized by the State for preparation of the Project Development Process for the reconstruction of State Route 51 Interchange over U. S. Route 23 in Lucas County, Ohio, identified as LUC-23-11.75.

CLAUSE II - INVOICE & PROJECT SCHEDULE

The State and the Consultant agree to the Invoice & Project Schedule including the overall Agreement length, and Scheduled Submittal dates and Review Times set out in the Project Schedule.

The Consultant agrees to submit the completed Invoice & Project Schedule transmittal letter together with the updated Invoice & Project Schedule for all billing purposes for all Parts of this Agreement every thirty (30) days as follows:

- (b) Two (2) copies of the updated Project Schedule.

CLAUSE III - PRIME COMPENSATION

The State agrees to compensate the Consultant for the performance of the authorized portions of the Work specified in this Agreement.

Actual costs plus a fixed fee of Seven Hundred Eighty-One Dollars (\$781.00). However, the maximum prime compensation shall not exceed Twenty-One Thousand Three Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars (\$21,394.00).

The total maximum prime compensation of all Parts which may be authorized for the subject Agreement is Three Million One Hundred Seventy-Four Thousand Five Hundred Ninety-Six Dollars (\$3,174,596.00).

Prime Compensations, only as agreed and by proper modification of this Agreement and authorized in writing by the State, may be added to or subtracted from under the authority of the Department of Transportation's "Specifications for Consulting Services, 2016 Edition".

CLAUSE IV - INCORPORATION BY REFERENCE

The following documents, or specified portions thereof, are hereby incorporated into and made a part of this Agreement as though expressly rewritten herein:

- (a) The Department of Transportation's "Specifications for Consulting Services, 2016 Edition".
- (b) The attached Geotechnical Field Exploration Schedule and the attached Laboratory Testing Fee Schedule dated April 14, 2021.
- (c) The attached Final Scope of Services dated May 5, 2021.
- (d) The Invoice & Project Schedule.
- (e) The most current Office of Budget and Management Travel Policy as published on the State of Ohio Website (https://budget.ohio.gov/TravelRule).

CLAUSE V - DISADVANTAGED BUSINESS ENTERPRISE (DBE) REQUIREMENTS

It is the policy of the Ohio Department of Transportation that Disadvantaged Business Enterprises (DBEs) shall have equal opportunity to compete for and perform subcontracts which the Consultant enters into pursuant to this contract. The Consultant must use good faith efforts to include DBE subconsultants. Consequently, the requirements of Title 49 CFR Part 26 apply to this contract. The Consultant must ensure that the DBE subconsultant(s) is performing a "commercially useful function" as defined in 49 CFR 26.55.

At least fifteen percent (15%) of this contract shall be subcontracted to DBE firms who have been certified as a DBE by the Ohio Department of Transportation.

In order to be assured that the Consultant complies with this contractual requirement during the course of the work, the Consultant shall:

- (a) Prior to starting work, provide a written plan for DBE participation including a breakdown by PDP step if applicable (or similar breakdown by task), description of work to be performed by each DBE subconsultant, and projected percentage of DBE participation during each step of the work.
- (b) Provide an ongoing summary of DBE subconsultant amounts invoiced, for the current invoice and as a running total for the contract.
- (c) Provide a quarterly report of the amounts actually paid to DBE subconsultants, and certification by the subconsultants of the amounts received.
- (d) Provide a written explanation if the level of DBE participation falls below the level stated in the DBE implementation plan, including a plan to meet the goal. If the goal cannot be met, the Consultant will be required to establish good faith efforts (GFEs).

CLAUSE VI - PROCESS FOR ESTABLISHING GOOD FAITH EFFORTS

The Consultant must document the progress and efforts being made in meeting the goal for DBE participation. In the event the Consultant is unable to meet the DBE Goal placed on this project, the Consultant must demonstrate it made good faith efforts to meet the goal. Good faith efforts may include: (1) Documentation that the consultant has obtained enough DBE participation to meet the goal; or (2) Documentation that it made adequate good faith efforts, as defined in 49 CFR 26.53, to meet the goal, even though it did not succeed in obtaining enough DBE participation to do so. Such information needs to be submitted to the Administrator, Office of Small & Disadvantaged Business Enterprise, Division of Opportunity, Diversity & Inclusion, 1980 West Broad Street, MS: 4190, Columbus, Ohio 43223.

The Department will determine whether the Consultant has made a good faith effort to meet the goal in accordance with 49 CFR 26.53 and Appendix A to Part 26. There will be no extension of time for the project granted if the Consultant wishes to avail itself of this process.

The Consultant may provide the following information and documentation to demonstrate GFEs:

- (a) Dollar value and % of DBE goal. Dollar value and % of the DBE goal shortfall.
- (b) Signed copy of each subcontract or purchase order agreement between the prime and DBE subconsultant utilized in meeting the contract goal.
- (c) Copy of dated written communication, fax confirmation, personal contact, follow up and negotiation with the DBEs.
- (d) Copy of dated written communication and/or dated fax confirmation of DBEs that were not interested in providing services.
- (e) Documentation of all efforts to assign additional work to DBEs currently under subcontract, and if those efforts fail, efforts to secure additional DBE subconsultants, including copies of dated written communication and/ or fax confirmation of personal contact, follow up and negotiation with the DBEs.
- (f) Documentation of additional GFEs to meet the DBE subcontract goal, by looking beyond the items typically subcontracted or consideration of subcontracting items normally performed by the prime as a way to meet the DBE goal.

The Department will review the submitted documentation and issue a written decision within 10 business days. The Consultant may request administrative reconsideration within 14 days of being informed that it did not demonstrate a GFE. The Consultant must make this request in writing to the following official:

Ohio Department of Transportation Division of Chief Legal Counsel 1980 West Broad Street, MS: 1500 Columbus, Ohio 43223

The reconsideration official will not have played any role in the original determination that the Consultant did not document sufficient GFEs.

As part of this reconsideration, the Consultant will have the opportunity to provide written documentation or an argument concerning the issue of whether it met the goal or made adequate GFEs to do so. ODOT will send the consultant a written decision on reconsideration explaining the basis for finding that the Consultant did or did not meet the goal or make adequate good faith efforts. The result of the reconsideration process is not administratively appealable.

CLAUSE VII - SANCTIONS FOR FAILING TO DEMONSTRATE ADEQUATE GFE

The Ohio Department of Transportation may issue sanctions if the Consultant fails to comply with the contract requirements and/or fails to demonstrate the necessary GFEs.

The Ohio Department of Transportation may impose any of the following sanctions:

- (a) letter of reprimand;
- (b) contract termination; and/or
- (c) other remedies available by law including administrative suspension (consultant debarred from pursuing additional contracts).

Factors to be considered in issuing sanctions include, but are not limited to:

- (a) the magnitude and the type of offense;
- (b) the degree of the Consultant's culpability;
- (c) any steps taken to rectify the situation;
- (d) the Consultant's record of performance on other projects including, but not limited to:
 - (1) annual DBE participation over DBE goals;
 - (2) annual DBE participation on projects without goals;
 - (3) number of complaints the Ohio Department of Transportation has received from DBEs regarding the Consultant; and
 - (4) the number of times the Consultant has been previously sanctioned by the Ohio Department of Transportation; and
- (e) Whether the Consultant falsified, misrepresented, or withheld information.

CLAUSE VIII - GENERAL PROVISIONS

It is fully understood and agreed that the Consultant, their employees, agent(s), and subconsultant(s) are independent contractors and not agents, servants, or employees of the State of Ohio or the Ohio Department of Transportation. The Consultant declares that it is engaged as an independent business and has complied with all applicable federal, state, and local laws regarding business permits and licenses of any kind, including but not limited to any insurance coverage that is required in the normal course of business.

Any person executing this Agreement in a representative capacity hereby warrants that he/she has been duly authorized by his/her principal to execute this Agreement on such principal's behalf.

Additionally, it is expressly understood by the parties that none of the rights, duties and obligations described in this Agreement shall be binding on either party until such time as the expenditure of funds is certified by the Director of Budget and Management, pursuant to Section 126.07 of the Ohio Revised Code.

IN WITNESS WHEREOF, the parties hereto have caused this Agreement to be executed as of the day and year first above written by affixing the signature of the duly authorized officer of Consultant and the signature of the Director of Transportation.

In 2019 we received a grant from the State of Ohio from their Abandoned Gas Station Fund to clean up the former Joe's Tire Store site at 6511 Monroe Street.

The grant was for \$250,000. To close out the grant the City needs to submit the proper documentation detailing the work that was done at the site of the cleanup and abatement.

With the documentation we need to submit a fee of \$18,200. TTL, our consultant that managed this grant for the City, decided to obtain closure of the grant through the OEPA (Ohio Environmental Protection Agency) because chemicals were identified in the soil at the site that were not petroleum compounds and impacts related to the former auto services which are not regulated by the Bureau of Underground Storage Tank Regulations (BUSTR).

The \$18,200 is a reimbursable expense for the original \$250,000 grant. There will be only \$14,060.57 left in the grant before this expense is submitted so the City will need to contribute \$4,139.43 to complete the project. The new total for this project will be \$254,139.43.

I recommend the approval of this appropriation.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 50-2019, passed June 3, 2019, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into a Grant Agreement between the Ohio Development Services Agency and the City of Sylvania for the Abandoned Gas Station Cleanup Grant Program for the property located at 6511 Monroe Street, Sylvania, Ohio; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 65-2019, passed July 15, 2019, accepted the proposal of TTL Associates, Inc. to administer the grant agreement for the Abandoned Gas Station Clean Up Grant Program for the property located at 6511 Monroe Street and appropriated funds therefore in the amount of \$107,000; and,

WHEREAS, the environmental clean up and abatement at the property has been completed; and,

WHEREAS, because chemicals were identified in the soil at the site that were not petroleum compounds not regulated by the Bureau of Underground Storage Tank Regulations ("BUSTR"), TTL recommended that the City obtain the appropriate certification from the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency regarding the clean up at the site; and,

WHEREAS, in order to obtain the appropriate certification and finalize the grant, the City has to submit a fee of \$18,200 to the Ohio Environmental Protection Agency; and,

WHEREAS, of the original \$250,000 grant, there is \$14,060.57 remaining which can be reimbursed to the City towards the payment of the \$18,200 fee, for a total cost of \$4,129.43 to the City; and,

WHEREAS, the Economic Development Director, by report dated August 13, 2021, has recommended that the appropriation be approved and the fee be paid. NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring: SECTION 1. That to provide funds for said fee hereby authorized, there is hereby appropriated from the CAPTIAL IMPROVEMENT FUND from funds therein not heretofore appropriated to Account No. 401-7750-53556 -South of Monroe (SOMO) the amount of Eighteen Thousand Two Hundred Dollars (\$18,200.00), with the remaining \$14,060.57 in the grant to be reimbursed to the City, for a total net cost to the City of \$4,139.43. 


Parks & Forestry Quarterly Report: April - June, 2021


Man-Hours by Work Type

Man-Hours by Account



Volume Collected (cubic yards)



Administrative Update

During the 2nd quarter of 2021, we experienced very low manpower with additional officers opting to retire, or taking extended sick leave. Officer Scott Kuebler retired on June 27th and at the end of the 2nd quarter, three officers were off on extended sick time or workman's compensation leave. During the 2nd quarter, officers Richardson and King completed Field Officer Training replacing officers who retired in 2020.

The police division completed a major project this quarter by updating over 160 new policies and procedures through our partnership with Lexipol. The Lexipol software allows officers in the field to access policy on any electronic devise and content is continually updated based on state law and best practices in law enforcement.

Community Affairs

Quarterly Report - 2nd Quarter 2021

"The mission of the Office of Community Affairs is to support the Sylvania Police Division in its efforts to maintain an atmosphere of safety and security for members of the community. To be effective in assisting in this mission, the Office of Community Affairs shall provide education in the areas of substance abuse and positive decision-making in all Sylvania Schools. The Office of Community Affairs shall also provide crime prevention programs and services to educate our citizens and businesses."

Introduction

Officer Barnswell completed the elementary D.A.R.E. curriculum at Highland Elementary and Maplewood Elementary. Officer Barnswell held a virtual D.A.R.E. graduation at Maplewood Elementary and a D.A.R.E. graduation outside at Highland Elementary due to COVID concerns. Officer Barnswell provided kindergarten bike safety and 3rd grade seatbelt safety talks to Sylvania Schools and St. Joseph School. Officer Barnswell also gave a presentation to kids attending summer camp at Sylvania Country Club.

Officer Gallup and Officer Beadle finished the second half of the 2020-2021 school year at Northview High School and Southview High School. Although the school year was unique due to COVID, the school year was successful without any significant issues to report. The City of Sylvania Police Division, the Sylvania Township Police Division, and the Sylvania School District continue to utilize a cooperative effort to maintain school safety in the district. The RAPTOR system was not utilized during the 2020-2021 school year as guests inside the school

building were prohibited during the pandemic. Sylvania Schools plans on putting the RAPTOR system back in place this coming fall, or during the 2021-2022 school year.

The Community Affairs staff coordinated and conducted the Safety City Program at Maplewood Elementary School. Sgt. Pack worked with IT to post a link on Sylvania Police Division's website that was password protected which allowed parents to obtain pictures of their kids from Safety City. Sgt. Pack also worked with IT to offered a virtual option for Safety City graduation for those who did not feel comfortable attending the in-person graduation during COVID. The program was a success and continues to receive positive responses from parents and children involved in the program.

The Sylvania Public Safety Cadets continues to be an excellent resource for our community. The program provides the opportunity for our youth to learn about law enforcement as they develop lifelong skills that will serve them well as they become adults. Currently, efforts are underway to change the Cadet's uniforms (new badge patch and shoulder patch) to reflect the change from Exploring to Public Safety Cadets. Additionally, new Public Safety Cadets t-shirts were ordered and received.
