Trunk Sanitary Sewer Lining Phase 2

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

In April of 2017 the City performed an inspection of our sanitary sewer system that is 15-inch diameter and larger. We discovered there were approximately 8,600 lineal feet of sanitary sewer that was rated as being in poor condition. The first phase of pipe rehabilitation has been completed and we are proceeding with Phase 2 of rehabilitating those pipes in need.

We received bids on January 14 and the lowest bid was submitted by Granite Inliner, LLC of Hilliard, Ohio in the amount of \$1,097,358.30. We have secured an Ohio Public Works Commission grant for 44.6% of the project, or \$489,421.80. The remaining cost of \$607,936.50 is the City's responsibility and we recommend this amount be financed through a 20-year OWDA loan with a current interest rate of 1.86%. Our current rate structure includes the anticipated debt payment for this loan.

We request approval to apply for a loan from OWDA in the amount of \$717,672.00 (10% construction contingency) for construction of this project.

WHEREAS, the City of Sylvania (hereinafter referred to as the "LGA") performed an inspection of the sanitary sewer system that is 15-inch diameter and larger in April, 2017; and,

WHEREAS, as a result of the inspection, it was discovered that there were approximately 8,600 lineal feet rated in poor condition; and,

WHEREAS, the LGA desires to obtain a loan from the Ohio Water Development

Authority (hereinafter referred to as the "OWDA") to finance a portion of the cost of the Sanitary

Sewer Lining Phase 2 Project; and,

WHEREAS, bids for the project were opened on January 14, 2022 and the lowest bid was submitted by Granite Inliner, LLC of Hilliard, Ohio in the amount of \$1,097,358.30; and,

WHEREAS, the City has received an Ohio Public Works Commission grant for 44.6% of the project, or \$489,421.80 with the remaining cost of \$607,936.50 being the City's responsibility; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated February 7, 2022, has recommended that the City's portion of the cost of the project in the amount of \$717,672.00 (10% construction contingency) be financed through a 20-year OWDA loan with a current interest rate of 1.86%.

Re: Harroun Park Invasive Species Treatment

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

In 2019 City Council authorized a 2-year agreement with The Nature Conservancy to provide restoration services towards the reduction of invasive species within Harroun Park. This effort has created much more open space in Harroun Park with scattered trees interspersed with native wildflowers. This initial effort also enabled the City to satisfy an OEPA invasive species reduction requirement as part of the original Phase 1 of the River Trail. The City received a letter from OEPA in December of 2021 that we are in compliance with the permit and no further action was required on our part.

However, the park continues to battle with invasive plant species. The invasive plants have been producing and dropping seeds for many years which has created a large seed bank. It is our recommendation to continue a minimum of semi-annual herbicide treatments per year in an effort to continue to diminish the invasive seed species. In addition, while several of the larger seed-producing invasive trees were removed in 2020-2021, there are still many of these mature trees remaining. The Nature Conservancy will continue to remove these trees and treat the cut-stumps with herbicide. Some patch mowing will also be done in order to control herbaceous invasives such as Reed Canary Grass which is abundant in the park.

The Nature Conservancy will also assist the City with education and outreach efforts to further highlight the park and the work that is being done to improve it.

We are requesting approval of an additional 2-year agreement with The Nature Conservancy in the amount of \$60,000 to continue the great work that has been started. The agreement calls for a commitment of \$29,528 in 2022 and \$30,472 in 2023. Funds have been appropriated in the 2022 Capital Improvement Plan for this work via fund 401-7310-53541.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>11</u> -2022

AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND DIRECTOR OF FINANCE TO ACCEPT THE PROPOSAL OF THE NATURE CONSERVANCY TO PROVIDE INVASIVE SPECIES TREATMENTS IN HARROUN PARK; APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFORE IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$60,000; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 101-2019, passed by Sylvania City Council on December 16, 2019, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to accept the proposal of The Nature Conservancy to provide Invasive Species Treatments in Harroun Park and appropriated funds in the amount of \$41,000 over the two-year term; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated February 7, 2022, has reported that the City's Agreement with The Nature Conservancy has resulted in much more open space in Harroun Park with scattered trees interspersed with native wildflowers and also fulfilled an Ohio Environmental Protection Agency invasive species reduction requirement as part of the original Phase I of the River Trail; and,

WHEREAS, The Nature Conservancy has proposed an additional 2-year Agreement in the total amount of \$60,000 to continue reducing the invasive plant species as well as assist the City with education and outreach efforts to highlight the park and the work being done to improve it; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated February 7, 2022, has recommended approval of the proposal of The Nature Conservancy to continue the reduction of invasive species in Harroun Park at a cost not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00) for the years 2022 and 2023.

County, Ohio, members elected thereto concurring: SECTION 1. That the Mayor and the Director of Finance be, and they hereby are, authorized to sign the proposal of The Nature Conservancy on behalf of this City, thereby indicating such approval of the proposal for the invasive species treatments in Harroun Park as provided in the Proposal now on file with the Clerk of Council. SECTION 2. That to provide funds for said services hereby authorized, there is hereby allocated from the CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND from funds therein not heretofore allocated to Account No. 401-7310-53541 - Harroun Park Improvements, an amount not to exceed Sixty Thousand Dollars (\$60,000.00). SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code. SECTION 4. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Ordinance in the Office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12, of the Charter of this City. SECTION 5. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, property and welfare and for the further reason that proposal for said professional services should be approved immediately so that the invasive species treatments in Harroun Park can proceed at the earliest possible time. Provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days after it is approved by the Mayor or as otherwise provided by the Charter. Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

The bidding documents for the above referenced project are complete. This project will reconstruct the existing composite pavement full-depth with new asphalt pavement from the railroad tracks to Main Street. In addition, the existing 8" waterline will be replaced between the railroad tracks and Richard Becker Place. Other items include new storm sewer, sidewalks meeting with current ADA guidelines, decorative street light replacements, and streetscape elements. Construction is scheduled to start in the spring of 2022.

The Service Department requested a proposal from American Structurepoint, Inc. to provide construction engineering and inspection services on the project. Their project manager, Darren Schimmoeller, has over 30 years of experience in the construction industry including 25-years with the Ohio Department of Transportation, District 1 Office, of which serving seven years as their District Construction Administrator.

The construction engineering services and inspection proposal received was in the amount of \$79,194 and includes as needed materials testing services from TTL Associates, Inc. This is an appropriated item in the 2022 capital improvement program and will be funded from account number 401-7610-53503. Owner's Project, of which Engineer's services under this Agreement are a part, is generally identified as follows: <u>Maplewood Avenue Reconstruction</u> ("Project").

Engineer's services under this Agreement are generally identified as follows: <u>Please see Attachment A</u> ("Services").

Owner and Engineer further agree as follows:

1.01 Basic Agreement and Period of Service

- A. Engineer shall provide or furnish the Services set forth in this Agreement. If authorized by Owner, or if required because of changes in the Project, Engineer shall furnish services in addition to those set forth above ("Additional Services").
- B. Engineer shall complete its Services within the following specific time period: As noted in Engineer's proposal dated January 20, 2022.
- C. If, through no fault of Engineer, such periods of time or dates are changed, or the orderly and continuous progress of Engineer's Services is impaired, or Engineer's Services are delayed or suspended, then the time for completion of Engineer's Services, and the rates and amounts of Engineer's compensation, shall be adjusted equitably.

2.01 Payment Procedures

- A. *Invoices:* Engineer shall prepare invoices in accordance with its standard invoicing practices and submit the invoices to Owner on a monthly basis. Invoices are due and payable within 45 days of receipt. If Owner fails to make any payment due Engineer for Services, Additional Services, and expenses within 30 days after receipt of Engineer's invoice, then (1) the amounts due Engineer will be increased at the rate of 1.0% per month (or the maximum rate of interest permitted by law, if less) from said due date, and (2) in addition Engineer may, after giving seven days written notice to Owner, suspend Services under this Agreement until Engineer has been paid in full all amounts due for Services, Additional Services, expenses, and other related charges. Owner waives any and all claims against Engineer for any such suspension.
- B. Payment: As compensation for Engineer providing or furnishing Services and Additional Services, Owner shall pay Engineer as set forth in Paragraphs 2.01, 2.02 (Services), and 2.03 (Additional Services). If Owner disputes an invoice, either as to amount or entitlement, then Owner shall promptly advise Engineer in writing of the specific basis for doing so, may withhold only that portion so disputed, and must pay the undisputed portion.

2.02 Basis of Payment

- A. Owner shall pay Engineer for Services as follows:
 - An amount equal to the cumulative hours charged to the Project by each class of Engineer's employees times standard hourly rates for each applicable billing class, plus Engineer's consultants' charges, if any, not to exceed \$79,194.00.
 - 2. Engineer's Standard Hourly Rates are attached as Appendix 1.
- B. Reimbursable expenses will be invoiced separately at their direct cost.
- 2.03 Additional Services: For Additional Services, Owner shall pay Engineer an amount equal to the cumulative hours charged in providing the Additional Services by each class of Engineer's employees, times standard hourly rates for each applicable billing class; plus reimbursement of expenses incurred in connection with providing the Additional Services and Engineer's consultants' charges, if any. Engineer's standard hourly rates are attached as Appendix 1. a fee to be negotiated at the time such Additional Services are requested.

3.01 Termination

- A. The obligation to continue performance under this Agreement may be terminated:
 - 1. For cause,
 - a. By either party upon 30 days written notice in the event of substantial failure by the other party to perform in accordance with the Agreement's terms through no fault of the terminating party. Failure to pay Engineer for its services is a substantial failure to perform and a basis for termination.
 - b. By Engineer:
 - 1) upon seven days written notice if Owner demands that Engineer furnish or perform services contrary to Engineer's responsibilities as a licensed professional; or
 - 2) upon seven days written notice if the Engineer's Services are delayed for more than 60 days for reasons beyond Engineer's control, or as the result of the presence at the Site of undisclosed Constituents of Concern, as set forth in Paragraph 5.01.I.
 - c. Engineer shall have no liability to Owner on account of a termination for cause by Engineer.
 - d. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this Agreement will not terminate as a result of a substantial failure under Paragraph 3.01.A.1.a if the party receiving such notice begins, within seven days of receipt of such notice, to correct its substantial failure to perform and proceeds diligently to cure such failure within no more than 30 days of receipt of notice; provided, however, that if and to the extent such substantial failure cannot be reasonably cured within such 30 day period, and if such party has diligently attempted to cure the same and thereafter continues diligently to cure the same, then the cure period provided for herein shall extend up to, but in no case more than, 60 days after the date of receipt of the notice.

- 2. For convenience, by Owner effective upon Engineer's receipt of written notice from Owner.
- B. In the event of any termination under Paragraph 3.01, Engineer will be entitled to invoice Owner and to receive full payment for all Services and Additional Services performed or furnished in accordance with this Agreement, plus reimbursement of expenses incurred through the receipt of notice of termination in connection with providing the Services and Additional Services, and Engineer's consultants' charges, if any.

4.01 Successors, Assigns, and Beneficiaries

- A. Owner and Engineer are hereby bound and the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives of Owner and Engineer (and to the extent permitted by Paragraph 4.01.B the assigns of Owner and Engineer) are hereby bound to the other party to this Agreement and to the successors, executors, administrators, and legal representatives (and said assigns) of such other party, in respect of all covenants, agreements, and obligations of this Agreement.
- B. Neither Owner nor Engineer may assign, sublet, or transfer any rights under or interest (including, but without limitation, money that is due or may become due) in this Agreement without the written consent of the other party, except to the extent that any assignment, subletting, or transfer is mandated by law. Unless specifically stated to the contrary in any written consent to an assignment, no assignment will release or discharge the assignor from any duty or responsibility under this Agreement.
- C. Unless expressly provided otherwise, nothing in this Agreement shall be construed to create, impose, or give rise to any duty owed by Owner or Engineer to any Constructor, other third-party individual or entity, or to any surety for or employee of any of them. All duties and responsibilities undertaken pursuant to this Agreement will be for the sole and exclusive benefit of Owner and Engineer and not for the benefit of any other party.

5.01 General Considerations

- A. The standard of care for all professional engineering and related services performed or furnished by Engineer under this Agreement will be the care and skill ordinarily used by members of the subject profession practicing under similar circumstances at the same time and in the same locality. Engineer makes no warranties, express or implied, under this Agreement or otherwise, in connection with any services performed or furnished by Engineer. Subject to the foregoing standard of care, Engineer and its consultants may use or rely upon design elements and information ordinarily or customarily furnished by others, including, but not limited to, specialty contractors, manufacturers, suppliers, and the publishers of technical standards. The Owner shall furnish, at the Owner's expense, all information, requirements, reports, data, surveys and instructions required by this Agreement. The Engineer may use such information, requirements, reports, data, surveys and instructions in performing its services and is entitled to rely upon the accuracy and completeness thereof. The Engineer shall not be held responsible for any errors or omissions that may arise as a result of erroneous or incomplete information provided by the Owner, consultants or contractors which the Owner requires Engineer to hire, and/or the Owner's consultants and contractors.
- B. Engineer shall not at any time supervise, direct, control, or have authority over any Constructor's work, nor shall Engineer have authority over or be responsible for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction selected or used by any Constructor, or the safety precautions and programs incident thereto, for security or safety at the Project site, nor for any failure of a Constructor to comply with

laws and regulations applicable to such Constructor's furnishing and performing of its work. Engineer shall not be responsible for the acts or omissions of any Constructor.

- C. Engineer neither guarantees the performance of any Constructor nor assumes responsibility for any Constructor's failure to furnish and perform its work.
- D. Engineer's opinions (if any) of probable construction cost are to be made on the basis of Engineer's experience, qualifications, and general familiarity with the construction industry. However, because Engineer has no control over the cost of labor, materials, equipment, or services furnished by others, or over contractors' methods of determining prices, or over competitive bidding or market conditions, Engineer cannot and does not guarantee that proposals, bids, or actual construction cost will not vary from opinions of probable construction cost prepared by Engineer. If Owner requires greater assurance as to probable construction cost, then Owner agrees to obtain an independent cost estimate.
- Engineer shall not be responsible for any decision made regarding the construction contract requirements, or any application, interpretation, clarification, or modification of the construction contract documents other than those made by Engineer or its consultants.
- F. All documents prepared or furnished by Engineer are instruments of service, and Engineer retains an ownership and property interest (including the copyright and the right of reuse) in such documents, whether or not the Project is completed. Owner shall have a limited license to use the documents on the Project, extensions of the Project, and for related uses of the Owner, subject to receipt by Engineer of full payment due and owing for all Services and Additional Services relating to preparation of the documents and subject to the following limitations:
 - Owner acknowledges that such documents are not intended or represented to be suitable for use on the Project unless completed by Engineer, or for use or reuse by Owner or others on extensions of the Project, on any other project, or for any other use or purpose, without written verification or adaptation by Engineer;
 - 2. any such use or reuse, or any modification of the documents, without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Engineer, as appropriate for the specific purpose intended, will be at Owner's sole risk and without liability or legal exposure to Engineer or to its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and consultants;
 - Owner shall hold harmless Engineer and its officers, directors, members, partners, agents, employees, and consultants from all claims, damages, losses, and expenses, including reasonable attorneys' fees, arising out of or resulting from any use, reuse, or modification of the documents without written verification, completion, or adaptation by Engineer; and
 - 4. such limited license to Owner shall not create any rights in third parties.
 - 5. Upon payment in full of all fees due by Owner, all right, title, and interest in any documents, plans, drawings, or instruments of service shall vest solely in the Owner. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Engineer shall retain its rights in pre-existing and standard scripts, databases, computer software, and other proprietary property. Rights to intellectual property that is not specifically created exclusively for the Owner in the performance of the services under this Agreement shall also remain the property of the Engineer.

- G. Owner and Engineer may transmit, and shall accept, Project-related correspondence, documents, text, data, drawings, information, and graphics, in electronic media or digital format, either directly, or through access to a secure Project website, in accordance with a mutually agreeable protocol.
- H. To the fullest extent permitted by law, Owner and Engineer (1) waive against each other, and the other's employees, officers, directors, members, agents, insurers, partners, and consultants, any and all claims for or entitlement to special, incidental, indirect, or consequential damages arising out of, resulting from, or in any way related to this Agreement or the Project, and (2) agree that Engineer's total liability to Owner under this Agreement shall be limited to \$50,000 or the total amount of compensation received by Engineer, whichever is greater, notwithstanding applicable insurance coverage.
- I. The parties acknowledge that Engineer's Services do not include any services related to unknown or undisclosed Constituents of Concern. If Engineer or any other party encounters, uncovers, or reveals an unknown or undisclosed Constituent of Concern, then Engineer may, at its option and without liability for consequential or any other damages, suspend performance of Services on the portion of the Project affected thereby until such portion of the Project is no longer affected, or terminate this Agreement for cause if it is not practical to continue providing Services.
- J. Owner and Engineer agree to negotiate each dispute between them in good faith during the 30 days after notice of dispute. If negotiations are unsuccessful in resolving the dispute, then the dispute shall be mediated. If mediation is unsuccessful, then the parties may exercise their rights at law.
- K. This Agreement is to be governed by the law of the state in which the Project is located.
- L. Engineer's Services and Additional Services do not include: (1) serving as a "municipal advisor" for purposes of the registration requirements of Section 975 of the Dodd-Frank Wall Street Reform and Consumer Protection Act (2010) or the municipal advisor registration rules issued by the Securities and Exchange Commission; (2) advising Owner, or any municipal entity or other person or entity, regarding municipal financial products or the issuance of municipal securities, including advice with respect to the structure, timing, terms, or other similar matters concerning such products or issuances; (3) providing surety bonding or insurance-related advice, recommendations, counseling, or research, or enforcement of construction insurance or surety bonding requirements; or (4) providing legal advice or representation.
- M. If the Project is constructed, Owner shall require the Constructor to purchase and maintain general liability insurance and to cause Engineer and Engineer's Consultants to be listed as additional insureds on a primary and non-contributory basis with respect to such liability insurance purchased and maintained by the Constructor for the Project.
- N. The Owner acknowledges the ongoing COVID-19 pandemic and agrees that Engineer's Compensation does not include any schedule or cost impacts that may occur as a result thereof. To the extent that there are cost or schedule impacts resulting from the COVID-19 pandemic, Engineer shall be entitled to an equitable modification to this Agreement.
- O. If required by the Contract Documents, Engineer shall review and approve, or take other action upon, the Constructor's submittals such as shop drawings, product data and samples, but only for the limited purposes of checking for conformance with the information given and the design concept expressed in the Contract Documents. Review of such submittals is not for the purpose of determining the accuracy or completeness of other information such as dimensions, quantities, and installation or performance of

equipment or systems, which are the Constructor's responsibility. The Engineer's review shall not constitute approval of safety precautions or construction means, methods, techniques, sequences or procedures. The Engineer's approval of a specific item shall not indicate approval of an assembly of which the item is a component.

P. If Engineer is required to review any submittals prior to final approval of plans by Owner or any required approval by governmental authorities, the review shall be limited to confirm general conformance with the preliminary design concept expressed by the preliminary design documents that are subject to material revisions in the process of developing the Owner-approved Contract Documents that bear the professional seal of the Engineer. The Owner understands and agrees that it is the Constructor's obligation to assume all costs to comply with the Contract Documents even if the Contract Documents differ materially from the preliminary design concept that is the subject of the submittal. Any notes made by Engineer on the submittal shall not relieve the Constructor from its duty to ensure compliance with the Contract Documents. Design and certification of manufactured items that are not specifically designed and detailed in the Contract Documents are the responsibility of the registered professional engineer working for the Constructor. The Constructor is responsible for all dimensions, quantities, fabrication, fit, and the coordination with other trades. Dimensions shall be confirmed and correlate by the Constructor at the job site.

6.01 Total Agreement

A. This Agreement (including any expressly incorporated attachments), constitutes the entire agreement between Owner and Engineer and supersedes all prior written or oral understandings. This Agreement may only be amended, supplemented, modified, or canceled by a duly executed written instrument.

7.01 Definitions

- A. Constructor—Any person or entity (not including the Engineer, its employees, agents, representatives, and consultants), performing or supporting construction activities relating to the Project, including but not limited to contractors, subcontractors, suppliers, Owner's work forces, utility companies, construction managers, testing firms, shippers, and truckers, and the employees, agents, and representatives of any or all of them.
- B. Constituent of Concern—Asbestos, petroleum, radioactive material, polychlorinated biphenyls (PCBs), hazardous waste, and any substance, product, waste, or other material of any nature whatsoever that is or becomes listed, regulated, or addressed pursuant to (a) the Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act, 42 U.S.C. §§9601 et seq. ("CERCLA"); (b) the Hazardous Materials Transportation Act, 49 U.S.C. §§5101 et seq.; (c) the Resource Conservation and Recovery Act, 42 U.S.C. §§6901 et seq.; (f) the Toxic Substances Control Act, 15 U.S.C. §§2601 et seq.; (e) the Clean Water Act, 33 U.S.C. §§1251 et seq.; (f) the Clean Air Act, 42 U.S.C. §§7401 et seq.; or (g) any other federal, State, or local statute, law, rule, regulation, ordinance, resolution, code, order, or decree regulating, relating to, or imposing liability or standards of conduct concerning, any hazardous, toxic, or dangerous waste, substance, or material.

A. Standard Hourly Rates:

- 1. Standard Hourly Rates are set forth in this Appendix 1 and include salaries and wages paid to personnel in each billing class plus the cost of customary and statutory benefits, general and administrative overhead, non-project operating costs, and operating margin or profit.
- 2. The Standard Hourly Rates apply only as specified in Paragraphs 2.01, 2.02, and 2.03, and are subject to annual review and adjustment.

1. ENGINEER PERSONNEL

For the fulfillment of all services outlined in Section 2 below, the ENGINEER will provide one full-time project inspector and an as-needed project engineer as required for a period of time necessary to complete the construction project and final construction report.

The qualifications and experiences of personnel provided by the ENGINEER are subject to approval by the OWNER, and no personnel will be assigned to the project until OWNER approval is obtained.

The full-time project inspector will take directions from and report to the OWNER on all matters concerning contract compliance and administration.

The full-time project inspector will coordinate project activities with the OWNER.

2. DESCRIPTION OF SERVICES

- a. <u>CONSTRUCTION SCHEDULE</u>: Review the construction schedule prepared by the contractor for compliance with the contract and give to the OWNER detailed documentation concerning its acceptability
- b. <u>Conferences</u>: Attend preconstruction conferences as directed by the OWNER, arrange a schedule of progress meetings and such other job conferences as are required for the timely and acceptable conduct of the job, and submit such schedules prepared to the OWNER for notification to those who are expected to attend. Record for the OWNER, as directed, minutes of such meetings. The ENGINEER shall be available for conferences as requested by the OWNER to review working details of the project. The OWNER may review and inspect the activities whenever desired during the life of the Agreement.
- c. <u>LIAISON</u>: Serve as the OWNER's liaison with the Contractor, working principally through the Contractor's field superintendent or such other person in authority as designated by the Contractor. Acting in liaison capacity, the project inspector shall be thoroughly familiar with the plans and specifications applicable to the project to monitor the Contractor for compliance with provisions therein. Any deviation observed shall be promptly reported to the contractor and OWNER by the project inspector.

Serve as the OWNER's liaison with the traveling public and nearby affected business owners and property owners. The project inspector will offer information and provide field office numbers to interested parties. If necessary, the project inspector will attend and participate in any public information meetings.

- d. <u>COOPERATE</u> with the OWNER in dealing with the various federal, state, and local agencies having jurisdiction over the project
- e. <u>ASSIST</u> the OWNER in obtaining from the contractor a list of his proposed suppliers and subcontractors
- f. ASSIST the OWNER in obtaining from the contractor additional details or information when needed at the job site for proper execution of work
- g. <u>EQUIPMENT</u>: Furnish all equipment necessary to sample and test materials in accordance with ODOT procedures
- h. <u>SAMPLES</u>: Obtain field samples of materials delivered to the site as required by the specifications

i. SHOP DRAWINGS

- i. Receive shop drawings and falsework drawings. Check for completeness and then forward to design personnel for approval.
- ii. Review approved shop and falsework drawings, specifications, and other submissions. Record receipt of this data, maintain a file of all drawings and submissions, and check construction for compliance in accordance with the contract documents.
- iii. Alert the contractor's field superintendent when it is observed materials or equipment are being or about to be used or installed before approval of shop drawings or samples, where such are required, and advise the OWNER when ENGINEER believes it is necessary to disapprove work as failing to conform to the contract documents.

j. REVIEW OF WORK, INSPECTION, AND TESTS

- i. Conduct on-site inspections for the OWNER of the work in progress as a basis for determining whether the project is proceeding in accordance with the Contract Documents.
- ii. Provide on-site acceptance testing of materials in the manner and extent prescribed by the latest edition of the ODOT Construction and Material Specifications and in accordance with current accepted practices
- iii. Accompany visiting inspectors representing local, state, or federal agencies having jurisdiction over the project, and report details of such inspection to the OWNER
- iv. Verify that the required testing has been accomplished

k. <u>Modification</u>: Consider and evaluate the Contractor's suggestions for modifications in drawings and/or specifications and report them with recommendations to the OWNER.

1. RECORDS

- i. Prepare and maintain at the job site orderly files of correspondence, reports of job conferences, shop drawings and other submissions, reproductions of original contract documents, including all addenda, change orders, and additional drawings subsequent to the award of the contract, progress reports, and other project-related documents
- ii. Keep a diary or logbook recording hours on the job site, weather conditions, a list of visiting officials, decisions, general observations, and specific observations with regard to test procedures. Upon request, furnish copies of such a diary or logbook to the OWNER.
- iii. Maintain for the OWNER a record of names, addresses, and telephone numbers of all subcontractors and major material suppliers.
- iv. Maintain a set of drawings on which authorized changes are noted and deliver to the OWNER upon request, but in any event at the completion of the project.
- v. Prepare the Final Construction Record and Final Estimate as required by the OWNER. Provide a copy of the Final Construction Record to the OWNER.
- m. **REPORTS:** Furnish to the OWNER at periodic intervals, as required, progress reports of the project, including the Contractor's compliance with the approved construction schedule.
- n. <u>PROGRESS ESTIMATES</u>: Prepare progress estimates or review Contractorsubmitted estimates for periodic partial payments to the Contractor and deliver to the OWNER for review and processing. The payments to the Contractor will be based on estimates of the value of work performed and materials complete and in place in accordance with the contract.
- o. <u>PROJECT RESPONSIBILITY</u>: The project inspector will be responsible for the documentation of pay quantities and estimates and the maintenance of appropriate records related to the construction of this project.

- p. Work Schedule and Suspension: The ENGINEER's crew will be required to regulate their work week to conform to the Contractor's hours in accordance with the directions of the OWNER. If work on the construction project is suspended and all matters concerning contract compliance and administration are complete, the services of the ENGINEER may also be suspended without cost to the project.
- q. <u>CONTRACT ADMINISTRATION</u>: The ENGINEER will administer the contract in accordance with OWNER and ODOT procedures.
- r. ENGINEER shall not at any time supervise, direct, or have control over Contractor's work, nor shall ENGINEER have authority over or responsibility for the means, methods, techniques, sequences, or procedures of construction selected or used by Contractor, for security or safety at the Site, for safety precautions and programs incident to the Contractor's work in progress, nor for any failure of Contractor to comply with laws and regulations applicable to Contractor's furnishing and performing the work. Work performed under this agreement shall be at the discretion of the OWNER project manager and may be modified at his discretion. Reduction of the scope of work shall not result in penalties due the ENGINEER for such reduction. Increase of the scope of work shall require executed of a supplement to the original agreement by both the ENGINEER and the OWNER.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>12</u> -2022

ACCEPTING THE PROPOSAL OF AMERICAN STRUCTUREPOINT, INC. TO PROVIDE CONSTRUCTION ENGINEERING AND INSPECTION SERVICES FOR THE MAPLEWOOD AVENUE RECONSTRUCTION PROJECT; APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFORE IN AN AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED \$79,194; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the plans for the Maplewood Avenue Reconstruction Project are complete and are now on file with the Clerk of Council; and,

WHEREAS, the plans provide for reconstructing the existing composite pavement with new asphalt pavement from the railroad tracks to Main Street, replacing the existing 8" waterline between the railroad tracks and Richard Becker Place as well as installing new storm sewer, sidewalks, decorative street light replacements and streetscape elements; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated February 7, 2022, has received a proposal from American Structurepoint, Inc. to provide construction engineering and inspection services on the project at a cost of \$79,194, and the Director of Public Service has recommended approval of that proposal.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. That the proposal of American Structurepoint, Inc. in the amount of Seventy-Nine Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars (\$79,194.00) to provide construction engineering and inspection services for the Maplewood Avenue Reconstruction Project, is hereby approved and accepted.

<u>SECTION 2.</u> That the Director of Public Service shall promptly give notice to said consultant to proceed under the proposal hereby approved and accepted.

SECTION 3. That to provide funds for said engineering and inspection services hereby authorized, there is hereby appropriated from the **CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND** from funds therein not heretofore appropriated to **Account No. 401-7610-53503** –**Street Improvements**, an amount not to exceed Seventy-Nine Thousand One Hundred Ninety-Four Dollars (\$79,194.00).

SECTION 4. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 5. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Ordinance in the Office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12, of the Charter of this City.

SECTION 6. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, property and welfare and for the further reason that the construction engineering and inspection services should commence at the earliest possible time and therefore this Ordinance should be effective immediately. Provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days after it is approved by the Mayor or as otherwise provided by the Charter.

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

This is the final change order request for the completed Cushman Road Improvements Project. A detailed summary of each change order item is enclosed and briefly outlined below:

- Driveway Culvert Modifications Several driveway culverts were extended to eliminate conflicts with Frontier Communication poles (\$24,000).
- Water Service Lowerings Multiple water services were lowered below the installed grade to be sufficiently under the drainage swales (\$14,560).
- Stop Work Order Mobilizations The Contractor was given two (2) stop work orders on the project causing increased costs to demobilize and remobilize manpower and equipment to the job site (\$19,875).
- Change Order No. 1 Adjustment The actual cost of installing Change Order No. 1 work items resulted in a deduction of \$11,351.64 from the approved estimate.
- Installed Quantity Adjustments The installed bid quantities have resulted in a decrease of \$8,914.97.

As a result, a final project change order increasing the contract amount by \$38,168.39 is necessary. We would recommend approval of Change Order No. 2 (Final) which will increase the contract amount from \$1,064,675.25 to \$1,102,843.64. Please call if you have any questions.

ORDINANCE NO. <u>13</u> -2022

AUTHORIZING THE MAYOR AND DIRECTOR OF FINANCE TO APPROVE CHANGE ORDER NO. 2 (FINAL) TO THIS CITY'S AGREEMENT WITH SALENBIEN TRUCKING AND EXCAVATING, INC. FOR THE CUSHMAN ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROJECT TO REFLECT THE AS-BUILT QUANTITIES; INCREASING THE CONTRACT AMOUNT BY \$38,168.39; APPROPRIATING FUNDS THEREFORE; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 2-2021, passed January 4, 2021, accepted the bid of Salenbien Trucking and Excavating, Inc. and awarded the contract for the Cushman Road Improvement Project to same, which bid was in the amount of \$891,839.44; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 53-2021, passed July 19, 2021, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to approve Change Order No. 1 to this City's Agreement with Salenbien Trucking and Excavating, Inc. for the Cushman Road Improvement Project to install an 8-inch diameter closed drainage pipe coupled with a 4-inch perforated drainage pipe with a filter sock laid in the bottom of the swale, stone backfill as required and dirt backfill to grade; and,

WHEREAS, the additional work authorized by Change Order No. 1 resulted in a net increase to the contract in the amount of One Hundred Seventy-Two Thousand Eight Hundred Thirty-Five and 81/100 Dollars (\$172,835.81); and,

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

Fishbeck has completed their study of the Elden Ditch Watershed as authorized by City Council on January 19, 2021 (Ord. 9-2021). As you may recall, the Utilities & Environment Committee discussed the Elden Ditch watershed at their meeting on September 8, 2020. At the conclusion of the meeting, the Committee recommended moving forward with the hydraulic study with the goal that any proposed infrastructure improvements resulting from the study could be considered for future Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) grant opportunities

The study has resulted in a four-phased approach to address issues within the watershed. Phase 1 recommended addressing capacity issues in the Veteran's Memorial Field area by installing an underground detention system west of the baseball diamonds. The detention facility would provide storage capacity up to the 25-year event and slowly release stormwater to the existing system over a longer period of time. The total cost of the Phase 1 project is estimated to be \$233,427 with construction scheduled to commence in August 2023. The City was successful with our November 2021 OPWC application and will be receiving \$91,000 towards the cost of the project. The Sylvania Area Joint Recreation District will be contributing \$49,500 towards the project as well.

Fishbeck has provided a proposal of \$27,840 to complete the Phase 1 engineering for the project. Engineering was included in the 2022 budget and would be funded from the 503-7510-51686 account. We would recommend approval of the proposal from Fishbeck in the amount of \$27,840. Please call if you should have any questions.

Dear Property Owner,

The purpose of this letter is to let you know about an important initiative that we are considering that may benefit your downtown business and property.

Last year, the City of Sylvania completed and adopted a Downtown Master Plan to help promote vibrancy, pedestrian connectivity, and improved public infrastructure. This Plan is available to review on the city's website located here www.cityofsylvania.com.

One tool that the Plan recommended was the creation of a tax increment financing (TIF) district to help generate additional revenue within the district. The revenues generated in the TIF district are not derived from a new levy or tax, but simply a redirection of the property taxes to help fund public infrastructure improvements in the TIF district.

Over time, as properties increase in value, additional property taxes are generated. With a TIF in place, a portion of these taxes would be redirected back to a separate city fund to directly benefit this district rather than go elsewhere in the community.

The first step is for the City to hold an information meeting to further explain how the TIF will work and we will be able to answer any questions you may have. The meeting will be held on Monday, March 7, 2022 at 6:30pm in City Council Chambers. Included in this mailing is a map of the proposed TIF area and an information sheet on TIF's.

TAX INCREMENT FINANCE (TIF) DISTRICTS

WHAT IS A TIF DISTRICT?

- Tax Increment Financing (TIF) is an economic development mechanism available to local governments in Ohio to finance public infrastructure improvements.
- TIF districts are drawn to include intended parcels that would be receiving new development.
- Typically, TIF districts may not exceed 300 contiguous acres.
- Revenues from the TIF districts can be used to extend utilities, create new roads, perform environmental remediation, acquire land, or build public structures (such as a municipal parking garage).

HOW DOES IT WORK?


- A local entity (The City of Sylvania) would enact legislation designating the TIF boundaries and the term of the TIF.
- Payments derived from the increased assessed value of any improvement to real property beyond existing current value are directed towards a separate fund to finance the construction of public infrastructure defined within the TIF legislation.
- Revenue collected over the term of the TIF, often 10-25 years, can be then
 used to pay for or service the debt of public infrastructure improvements on the
 designated site.

KEY CONSIDERATIONS

- The City or entity must first reach consensus on intended properties to be within the TIF district, as well as the proposed improvements that will be funded by TIF revenue.
- While TIF funds are received from improvement values within its borders, new development typically creates a 'ripple effect' of property value increases nearby over time.
- In some instances, the increase in tax burden on surrounding non-TIF properties may become unsustainable. Cities often partially or fully abate increased nearby property tax burdens for the life of the TIF.






Parks & Forestry Quarterly Report: October - December, 2021

Man-Hours by Work Type




Man-Hours by Account








Man-Hours by Work Type








2021 Compost Inventory

Green Yard Waste - Volume/Man-Hour/Route Distribution


