Mrs. Westphal presented the October 6, 2025 regular meeting minutes. Mrs. Westphal gave a brief report on the three public hearings held this date. First, Proposed Ordinance No. 91-2025, "Amending Part Eleven – Planning and Zoning Code of the Codified Ordinances of Sylvania, 1979, as amended, by amending Chapter 1179 – Principles of Acceptability, Section 1179.05 – Lots" was discussed. Nobody spoke for or against this proposed ordinance. Mr. Haynam moved, Mr. Murphy seconded to advance legislation to council for consideration; roll call vote being: Haynam, Richardson, Westphal, Murphy, Hansen; (5) yeas; (0) nays. The motion carried.

Report from 3 Public Hearings held this date.

Second, Petition for Zoning Ordinance Amendment Application SUP-3-2025 from Benjamin & Amanda Milliron at 5916 Main Street, Sylvania, Ohio requesting approval of ground-mounted solar energy systems to be added to their property was discussed. Two neighbors spoke in favor of the project and one neighbor, Steve Miller, spoke against the project as it would not uphold the historical integrity of Sylvania and he does not want to look at it from the second story of his house. Mr. Haynam requested to see the 3D renderings and to visit the property before making any decisions on this

application. Mrs. Westphal agreed that council is not ready at this time to move forward with a decision until more information is gathered.

Lastly, Petition for Zoning Ordinance Amendment Application ZA-1-2025 from Mike Hojnacki for 5540 N. Centennial Road, Sylvania, Ohio requesting a zoning change from "Mixed" to "B-2" to allow for a Commercial Flex Space Development was discussed. Mr. Hojnacki was not present, but his attorney did speak briefly on the project and answered a few questions from council. Mr. Boyers from the neighboring American Legion spoke in favor of the project. Nobody spoke against the project. Mr. Haynam moved, Mr. Hansen seconded to advance legislation to council for consideration; roll call vote being: Haynam, Richardson, Westphal, Murphy, Hansen; (5) yeas; (0) nays. The motion carried.

ORDINANCE NO.117-2025

TO MAKE APPROPRIATIONS FOR CURRENT EXPENDITURES AND OTHER EXPENDITURES OF THE CITY OF SYLVANIA, OHIO, FOR THE FISCAL YEAR ENDING DECEMBER 31, 2026; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, it is provided by State law and the Sylvania City Charter that an annual appropriation ordinance shall be passed by Council; and,

WHEREAS, attached hereto is "Exhibit A" entitled "2026 Budget Summary of Estimated Expenditures" which exhibit identifies by a four-digit department code number and name each Account in a Fund identified by a three-digit code and name to which appropriations within such Fund are made by this ordinance; and

WHEREAS, attached hereto is "Exhibit B" entitled "2026 Budget Summary of Revenues (2023 - 2026)" which exhibit lists the specific sources of revenue and the actual amounts received by the City from each source within each Fund for the years 2023 and 2024, and the estimated amounts expected to be received by the City from each source for each Fund for the years 2025 and 2026, referred to herein as "estimated resources."

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County,

Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. That to provide for the current expenditures and other expenditures of the City of Sylvania for the fiscal year ending December 31, 2026, the following appropriations are hereby authorized.

SECTION 2. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the GENERAL FUND the sum of \$17,726,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for said Fund, as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$18,000,000.

- SECTION 3. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the STREET CONSTRUCTION, MAINTENANCE AND REPAIR FUND the sum of \$1,510,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund, as shown in "Exhibit B", total \$1,480,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.
- SECTION 4. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the CITY PERMISSIVE TAX FUND the sum of \$250,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Accounts. Estimated Resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$450,000.
- SECTION 5. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the STATE HIGHWAY IMPROVEMENT FUND the sum of \$90,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$90,000.
- SECTION 6. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the LAW ENFORCEMENT TRUST FUND the sum of \$5,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$5,000.
- SECTION 7. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the DRUG LAW ENFORCEMENT TRUST FUND the sum of \$30,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$30,000.
- SECTION 8. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the INDIGENT DRIVERS ALCOHOL TREATMENT FUND the sum of \$30,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$30,000.
- SECTION 9. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the INDIGENT DRIVERS ALCOHOL MONITOR FUND the sum of \$25,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$25,000.
- SECTION 10. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the FEDERAL EQUITABLE SHARING FUND the sum of \$200,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$10,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.
- SECTION 11. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the INDIGENT SUPPORT FUND the sum of \$40,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$40,000.

SECTION 12. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the GENERAL OBLIGATION DEBT SERVICE FUND the sum of \$1,215,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$1,120,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 13. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND the sum of \$11,214,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$7,700,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 14. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the COURT CAPITAL IMPROVEMENT FUND the sum of \$100,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$120,000.

SECTION 15. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the TAX INCREMENT FINANCING FUND the sum of \$300,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$200,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 16. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the SPECIAL ASSESSMENT SERVICES TREE REPAIR & REPLACEMENT FUND the sum of \$230,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$230,000.

SECTION 17. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the SPECIAL ASSESSMENT SERVICE STREET LIGHTING FUND the sum of \$410,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$400,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 18. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the SPECIAL ASSESSMENT SERVICES DITCH & DRAINAGE FUND the sum of \$533,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$430,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 19. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the WATER FUND the sum of \$5,964,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$5,650,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 20. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the SEWER FUND the sum of \$4,590,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$4,900,000.

SECTION 21. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the RESOURCE RECOVERY FUND the sum of \$107,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$75,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 22. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the MEDICAL CARE – SELF INSURED FUND the sum of \$2,800,000 to the Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for the respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$2,800,000.

SECTION 23. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the POLICE PENSION FUND the sum of \$800,000 to the respective Account of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the amount and for respective purpose shown for such Account. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$800,000.

SECTION 24. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the PROPERTY ROOM FUND the sum of \$8,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$8,000.

SECTION 25. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the INCOME TAX FUND the sum of \$9,032,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$9.105.000.

SECTION 26. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the UNCLAIMED MONIES FUND the sum of \$5,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$5,000.

SECTION 27. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the JOINT ECONOMIC DEVELOPMENT DISTRICT FUND the sum of \$150,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for the respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$100,000. There is a sufficient balance as of January 1, 2026 in this Fund to be considered as available for appropriation.

SECTION 28. That there be and is hereby appropriated from the POLICE COMMUNITY AFFAIRS FUND the sum of \$10,000 to the respective Accounts of said Fund listed in "Exhibit A" in the several amounts and for respective purposes shown for such Accounts. Estimated resources for 2026 for this Fund as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$10,000.

SECTION 29. Estimated resources for the PARKS-RECREATION FOUNDATION FUND for 2026 as shown in "Exhibit B" total \$2,000.

SECTION 30. That "Exhibit C" attached hereto is illustrative of the transfers anticipated within the 2026 Operating Budget.

SECTION 31. That the Director of Finance be and he is hereby authorized and directed to draw warrants against any of the foregoing appropriations upon proper certificates or vouchers therefore, approved by any officer or officers authorized by law to approve the same, or by any Ordinance or Resolution of Council to make expenditures or as otherwise provided by law.

SECTION 32. That the Director of Finance be and he is hereby authorized to make all operating transfers as delineated in the 2026 Budget, shown on "Exhibit A".

SECTION 33. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of the Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this Council and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all requirements including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 34. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Ordinance in the Office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building, pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12, of the Charter of this City.

SECTION 35. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, property and welfare and for the further reason that immediate provision should be made for the enactment of appropriations for the payment of current expenditures for the calendar year of 2026. Provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days after it is approved by the Mayor or as otherwise provided by the Charter.

Re: Plummer Pool Bath House Renovations - Change Order No. 3 (Final)

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

Van Tassel Construction Corp. has completed the interior renovation work at the Plummer Pool Bath House in Burnham Park. Now that all work items have been completed, the Service Department is requesting a project change order to adjust the final contract price.

This change order corrects two flooring issues that developed shortly before and after the Bath House opened around the Memorial Day holiday. Prior to Memorial Day, several areas of the existing floor were open cut for plumbing improvements. After the specified floor coating was applied to all surfaces there were noticeable coating failures at the concrete cut joints, presumably from the concrete curing process. In addition, once the facility was opened to the public the new surface caused a slippery when wet condition despite the product specifications citing the finish to be slip-resistant.

A rubber matting was installed to alleviate the issue temporarily during the operating year. Once the facility closed for the season Van Tassel Construction remobilized and performed diamond grinding operations to remove the surface and installed a new non-skid coating with a medium aggressive finish.

As a result, a final project change order in the amount of \$16,943.00 is necessary to increase the contract amount from \$417,604.08 to \$434,547.08. With this increase the total construction cost was approximately 10.3% over the original contract amount of \$394,000. We recommend approval of Change Order No. 3 (Final) in the amount of \$16,943.00 with Van Tassel Construction Corp. Please call with any questions

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 34-2024, passed March 4, 2024, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into a Joint Cooperation Agreement on behalf of the City of Sylvania with the Sylvania Area Joint Recreation District ("SAJRD") relative to the Plummer Pool Improvement Project; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 108-2024, passed October 7, 2024, accepted the bid of Van Tassel Construction Corporation and awarded the contract for the Plummer Pool Bath House Renovations Project to same, which bid was in the amount of \$394,000; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 135-2024, passed December 16, 2024, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to approve Change Order No. 1 to this City's Agreement with Van Tassel Construction Corporation for the Plummer Pool Bath House Renovations Project for additional work items required and increased the contract amount by \$15,382.14; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 79-2025, passed July 21, 2025, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to approve Change Order No. 2 to this City's Agreement with Van Tassel Construction Corporation for the Plummer Pool Bath House Renovations Project for additional work items and increased the contract amount by \$8,221.84; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Service, by report dated November 3, 2025, has

recommended acceptance of Change Order No. 3 (Final) of Van Tassel Construction

Corporation for said Plummer Pool Bath House Renovations to reflect additional work item to

correct two flooring issues in the amount of \$16,943.00, for a final contract amount of

\$434,547.08; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 89-2007, passed October 1, 2007, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners for after hours animal control services by the dog warden of Lucas County, Ohio; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 5-2011, passed February 7, 2011, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners for after hours animal control services by the dog warden of Lucas County; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 88 -2013, passed December 2, 2013, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County

Commissioners for after hours canine control services for the years 2014, 2015 and 2016; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 73-2016, passed November 21, 2016, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County

Commissioners for after hours canine control services for the years 2017 and 2018; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 65-2018, passed December 3, 2018, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners for after hours canine control services for the years 2019, 2020 and 2021; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 69-2021, passed October 4, 2021, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners for after hours canine control services for the years 2022, 2023 and 2024; and,

WHEREAS, Ordinance No. 131-2024, passed December 2, 2024, authorized the Mayor and Director of Finance to enter into an Agreement with the Board of Lucas County Commissioners for after hours canine control services for the year 2025; and,

WHEREAS, the City's Agreement with the Board of County Commissioners of Lucas County, Ohio, expires on December 31, 2025 and the Commissioners have proposed a new agreement for a three-year term and no increase in the cost of this service; and,

WHEREAS, the Director of Public Safety has recommended this Agreement be approved; and,

WHEREAS, the Board of County Commissioners has been providing after hours animal control services by the dog warden to this City at an annual cost of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) to cover the base cost of operating the service plus an amount based upon four hours of overtime pay for the Canine Care Officer at the prevailing rate of pay including actual extra cost to the County for fringe benefits created by the overtime service; and,

WHEREAS, this Council desires to have animal control services around the clock.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. That the Mayor and Director of Finance be, and they hereby are authorized to enter into an agreement with the Board of County Commissioners for after hours animal control services of the dog warden providing for a payment to Lucas County in the amount of Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) for the years 2026, 2027 and 2028.

SECTION 2. That all charges under the agreement entered into with the Board of County Commissioners of Lucas County, Ohio, for animal control services of the dog warden shall be charged to and paid from Account No. 110-7110-52268 - Miscellaneous Law Enforcement.

SECTION 3. It is hereby found and determined that all formal actions of this Council concerning and relating to the passage of this Ordinance were adopted in an open meeting of this

Council, and that all deliberations of this Council and of any of its committees that resulted in such formal action, were in meetings open to the public, in compliance with all legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the Ohio Revised Code.

SECTION 4. That the Clerk of Council is hereby directed to post a copy of this Ordinance in the Office of the Clerk of Council in the Municipal Building pursuant to ARTICLE III, Section 12, of the Charter of this City.

SECTION 5. That this Ordinance is hereby declared to be an emergency measure necessary for the immediate preservation of the public peace, health, safety, property and welfare and for the further reason that twenty-four (24) hour per day animal control services should be authorized to be continued at the earliest possible time, and therefore, this Ordinance should be effective immediately. Provided this Ordinance receives the affirmative vote of five (5) or more members elected to Council, it shall take effect and be in force immediately upon its passage and approval by the Mayor; otherwise, it shall take effect and be in force thirty (30) days after it is approved by the Mayor or as otherwise provided by the Charter.

AGREEMENT BETWEEN THE CITY OF SYLVANIA, OHIO AND THE BOARD OF COUNTY COMMISSIONERS LUCAS COUNTY, OHIO

This Agreement entered into at Sylvania, Lucas County, Ohio, this day of
, 2025, between the City of Sylvania (hereinafter referred to as 'CITY') and
the Board of County Commissioners of Lucas County, Ohio (hereinafter referred to as
"COMMISSIONERS") providing for animal control services by the Dog Warden of Lucas
County for the "CITY", among other things.
WHEREAS, The "COMMISSIONERS", pursuant to Section 955.12 of the Ohio Revised
Code have certain obligations to appoint a Dog Warden; and
WHEREAS, Section 715.23 of the Ohio Revised Code allows municipalities to
regulate the running at large of dogs; and
WHEREAS, Section 307.15, of the Ohio Revised Code authorizes service contracts
between Board of County Commissioners and the legislative authority of municipal corporations; and
WHEREAS, by Resolution No, passed by the City of Sylvania on
, 2025, the 'CITY" is authorized to execute this agreement.
NOW, THEREFORE, for and consideration of the foregoing premises and for good
and valuable consideration as hereinafter provided, it is agreed by the parties as follows:

AR TI CLE I - ANIMAL CONTROL

- 1. Effective January 1, 2026, Lucas County Canine Care & Control shall be available to the City of Sylvania Police Division on an on-call basis after regular work hours and weekends for dog control services.
- 2. This on-call service shall be available Monday through Friday beginning at 4 p.m. and ending at 8 a.m. each week, plus weekend coverage. This on call after hours service shall also be provided on all holidays. On-duty personnel at no cost will provide these same services during all other hours to the "CITY".

- 3. This service shall be used only in emergency situations which are defined as a situation involving a dog that is at large and has bitten some person or is menacing or attempting to bite some person, and the owner of the dog is unknown or is not available to control the dog, and an officer on the scene has requested assistance to seize the animal; or an officer in executing a warrant to enter private property, residence, or building is confronted with a threatening situation involving a dog and requests assistance to subdue and/or seize the animal.
- 4. Service shall be initiated by the local Police Division by calling the telephone number, which shall be provided to them. Upon receipt of an emergency call, the Canine Control Officer shall immediately depart for the location of the incident and provide necessary services. A City Police Officer shall stand by until the Canine Control Officer's arrival and render whatever reasonable assistance they require. Whenever the Canine Control Officer determines the situation in question to be dangerous and there is no police backup, then they shall either refuse the call or immediately leave the scene.
- 5. In consideration of this service, for 2026 2028, the "CITY" shall pay to Lucas County, Two Thousand Five Hundred Dollars (\$2,500.00) per year to cover the base cost of operating the service plus an amount based upon four hours of overtime pay for the Canine Care Officer at the prevailing rate of pay including actual extra cost to the "COUNTY" for fringe benefits created by the overtime service.
- 6. The "CITY" shall pay LUCAS COUNTY, mileage at the prevailing Internal Revenue Service rate for actual mileage on each after hour-call out emergency situation request.
- 7. LUCAS COUNTY shall bill the "CITY" on a quarterly basis for actual services rendered and costs incurred. The records of such costs shall be maintained and open to the inspection of the "CITY".

ARTICLE II- ENFORCEMENT OF SECTION 505.10 OF THE CODIFIED ORDIANCE OF SYLVANIA

8. Effective January 1, 2026, Lucas County Canine Care & Control will enforce Section 505.10 of the Codified Ordinances of Sylvania, 1979, as amended, entitled "Rabies Immunization Required", but only as it pertains to dogs. Enforcement services shall include but not be limited to investigation of possible violations and issuing and serving of summons/complaints through the City of Sylvania Prosecutor's Office.

- 9. Fines resulting from enforcement of section 505 .10 of the Codified Ordinances of Sylvania, 1979, as amended, shall be collected by the "CITY" and deposited into the "CITY" treasury pursuant to the Ohio Revised Code 1901. 31 (F).
- 10. The "CITY" shall pay Ten Dollars (\$10.00) to the "COUNTY" for each citation issued. The "COUNTY" shall bill the "CITY" on a quarterly basis for each actual citation issues.

ARTICLE III - MISCELLANEOUS

- 11. The parties may amend this agreement from time to time in writing, provided that such amendments shall be attached hereto and become a part hereof.
- 12. The term of this Agreement is effective for the term of three (3) years effective January 1, 2026, through December 31, 2028.

ORDINANCE NO. 120-2025

AN ORDINANCE IMPLEMENTING SECTIONS 3735.65 THROUGH 3735.70 OF THE OHIO REVISED CODE, ESTABLISHING AND DESCRIBING THE BOUNDARIES OF THE LITTLE-CENTENNIAL COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA IN THE CITY OF SYLVANIA, DESIGNATING A HOUSING OFFICER TO ADMINISTER THE PROGRAM, AND CREATING A COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT HOUSING COUNCIL AND A TAX INCENTIVE REVIEW COUNCIL; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, the council of the City of Sylvania (hereinafter "Council") desires to pursue all reasonable and legitimate incentive measures to assist and encourage development in specific areas of the City of Sylvania that have not enjoyed reinvestment from remodeling or new construction; and,

WHEREAS, a survey of housing, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Clerk of Council as required by Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Section 3735.66 has been prepared for the area to be included in the proposed Community Reinvestment Area; and,

WHEREAS, the maintenance of existing and construction of new structures in such area would serve to encourage economic stability, maintain real property values, and generate new employment opportunities; and,

WHEREAS, the remodeling of existing structures or the construction of new structures in this Community Reinvestment Area constitutes a public purpose for which real property exemptions may be granted.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Sylvania, Lucas

County, Ohio, _____ members elected thereto concurring:

SECTION 1. The area designated as the Little-Centennial Community Reinvestment

SECTION 1. The area designated as the Little-Centennial Community Reinvestment Area constitutes an area in which housing facilities or structures of historical significance are located, and in which new construction or repair of existing facilities has been discouraged.

SECTION 2. Pursuant to ORC Section 3735.66, the Little-Centennial Community Reinvestment Area is hereby established in the area as legally described on the attached "Exhibit A" which is incorporated herein by reference. The Community Reinvestment Area is approximately depicted as the crosshatched area on the map attached to this Ordinance as "Exhibit B" and by this reference incorporated herein.

Only residential, commercial and/or industrial properties consistent with the applicable zoning regulations within the designated Community Reinvestment Area will be eligible for exemptions

under this Program.

SECTION 3. All properties identified in Exhibit A as being within the designated Community Reinvestment Area are eligible for this incentive.

SECTION 4. Within the Community Reinvestment Area, the percentage of the tax exemption on the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from improvements to commercial and industrial real property and the term of those exemptions shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of construction or remodeling occurring according to the rules outlined in the ORC Section 3765.67. The results of the negotiation as approved by this Council will be set in writing in a Community Reinvestment Area Agreement as outlined in ORC Section 3735.671. For residential property, a tax exemption on the increase in the assessed valuation resulting from the improvements as described in ORC Section 3735.67 shall be granted upon application by the property owner and certification thereof by the designated Housing Officer for the following periods.

a. Twelve (12) years, for the remodeling of every residential dwelling unit containing not more than two housing units and upon which the cost of remodeling is at least \$2,500, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, and with such exemption being one hundred percent (100 %) for each of the Twelve (12) years.

b. Up to and including fifteen (15) years, for the remodeling of every residential dwelling unit containing more than two housing units and upon which the cost of remodeling is at least \$5,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, and with such exemption being up to one hundred percent (100 %), the term and percentage of which shall be negotiated on a

case-by-case basis in advance of remodeling occurring.

c. Up to and including fifteen (15) years, for the construction of new dwellings, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, with such exemption being up to one hundred percent (100 %), the term and percentage of which shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis. d. Up to, and including, fifteen (15) years, and up to, and including, one hundred percent (100 %) for the remodeling of existing commercial and industrial facilities and upon which the cost of remodeling is at least \$5,000, as described in ORC Section 3735.67, the term and percentage of which shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of remodeling occurring.

e. Up to, and including, fifteen (15) years, and up to, and including, one hundred percent (100 %) for the construction of new commercial or industrial facilities, the term and percentage of which shall be negotiated on a case-by-case basis in advance of

construction occurring.

For the purposes of the above-described Community Reinvestment Area, structures exclusively used for residential purposes and composed of two (2) and fewer units shall be classified as residential structures.

If remodeling qualifies for an exemption, during the period of the exemption, the exempted percentage of the dollar amount of the increase in market value of the structure shall be exempt from real property taxation. If new construction qualifies for an exemption, during the period of the exemption the exempted percentage of the structure

shall not be considered to be an improvement on the land on which it is located for the purpose of real property taxation.

For the purposes of above-described Community Reinvestment Area, the applicant must reach an agreement with the Sylvania City School District for the tax revenue the School District would have received if not for the abatement.

SECTION 5. All commercial and industrial projects are required to comply with the state application fee requirements of ORC Section 3735.672 (C) and the local annual monitoring fee of one percent of the amount of taxes exempted under the agreement - a minimum of \$500 up to a maximum of \$2500 annually unless waived.

SECTION 6. To administer and implement the provisions of this Ordinance, the Mayor is designated as the Housing Officer as described in Sections 3735.65 through 3735.70.

SECTION 7. That a "Community Reinvestment Area Housing Council" shall be created, consisting of two members appointed by the Mayor of the City of Sylvania, two members appointed by the Council of the City of Sylvania and one member appointed by the Planning Commission of the City of Sylvania. The majority of the members shall then appoint two additional members who shall be residents within the area. Terms of the members of the Council shall be for three years. An unexpired term resulting from a vacancy in the Council shall be filled in the same manner as the initial appointment was made. The Community Reinvestment Area Council shall make an annual inspection of the properties within the district for which an exemption has been granted under Section 3735.67 of the ORC. The Council shall also hear appeals under Section 3735.70 of the ORC.

A Tax Incentive Review Council shall be established pursuant to ORC Section 5709.85 and shall consist of three representatives appointed by the Board of County Commissioners, two representatives of the municipal corporation, appointed by the Mayor with Council concurrence, the county auditor or designee and a representative of each affected Board of Education. At least two members must be residents of the City of Sylvania. The Tax Incentive Review Council shall review annually the compliance of all agreements involving the granting of exemptions for commercial or industrial real property improvements under Section 3735.671, of the ORC and make written recommendations to the Council as to continuing, modifying or terminating said agreement based upon the performance of the agreement.

SECTION 8. The council reserves the right to re-evaluate the designation of the Little-Centennial Community Reinvestment Area after December 31, 2026, at which time the Council may direct the Housing Officer not to accept any new applications for exemptions as described in Section 3735.67 of the ORC.

<u>SECTION 9.</u> The Community Reinvestment Area Housing Council shall make an annual inspection of the properties within the district for which an exemption has been granted under Section 3735.67 of the ORC. The council shall also hear appeals under 3735.70, of the ORC.

SECTION 10. The Council hereby finds and determines that all formal actions relative to the passage of this Ordinance were taken in an open meeting of this Council, that all deliberations of this Council and of its committees, if any, which resulted in formal action were taken in meetings open to the public, in full compliance with the applicable legal requirements, including Section 121.22 of the ORC.

SECTION 11. That this ordinance shall take effect and be enforce from and after the earliest period allowed by land and upon confirmation by the Director of the Ohio Development Services Agency of the findings in this Ordinance.

SECTION 12. The Mayor of the City of Sylvania is hereby directed and authorized to petition the Director of the Ohio Development Services Agency to confirm the findings



COMMUNITY REINVESTMENT AREA Housing Survey

PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this report is to determine whether the area shown in Appendix A should be designated as a Community Reinvestment Area (CRA) as defined by the Ohio Revised Code (ORC) Sections 3735.65-3735.70. The survey area is entirely made up of census tracts . The proposed CRA location represents property in the Centennial Road/Erie Street area which has _____ total housing units according to the U.S. Census Bureau. By establishing a CRA in this area, the City of Sylvania would be better able to encourage development and improvement in this area.

GENERAL DESCRIPTION OF SYLVANIA, OHIO

The City of Sylvania is a suburban city located northwest of Toledo in Lucas County. The City has a diverse base of employers including health care and higher education.

The proposed CRA was annexed to the City of Sylvania from Sylvania Township in 20

GENERAL DEMOGRAPHIC CHARACTERISTICS

The best indicators to use to describe and identify past conditions and trends in the community are the demographic and socio-economic characteristics provided by the U.S. Census Bureau. The statistical information provided in this section, unless noted, was derived from census reports published by the U.S. Census Bureau. Errors in the data are possible based on the way census data is collected, however, the discrepancies will not negate the usefulness of the census data to conduct the analysis.

Population

The City of Sylvania's population increased marginally from 2010 to 2020, while Lucas County's population decreased by 2.4%. The following table illustrates the population changes between 2010 and 2020:

5540 Centennial Rd.

This single-family residence was built in 1954 and is approximately 912 square feet. This structure has been issued a D+ grade by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8118 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1961 and is approximately 3,284 square feet. This structure is graded C by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8220 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1878 and is approximately 1,730 square feet. This structure is graded D+ by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8143 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1989 and is approximately 1,676 square feet. This structure is graded C- by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8206 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1939 and is approximately 2,509 square feet. This structure is graded C by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8235 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1962 and is approximately 2,200 square feet. This structure is graded C- by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8253 Erie St.

This single-family residence was built in 1959 and is approximately 1,322 square feet. This structure is graded C- by the Lucas County Auditor's Office.

8208 Erie St.



Toledo Edison Billing Proposal

Dear Mr. Mayor and Council Members:

There are four (4) utility companies with aerial facilities in the second block of Main Street between Maplewood Avenue and Erie Street including Buckeye Cable, Frontier Communications, Spectrum, and Toledo Edison. These utility companies have been asked to relocate from aerial facilities to below grade as a part of the Downtown Transportation Improvements Project.

The Service Department has been coordinating the relocation work with Toledo Edison. On September 15, 2025 City Council authorized the execution of a Subordination Agreement (Ord. 108-2025) as well as three utility easements on City-owned property at 6501 Monroe Street, 5757 Main Street, and 5734 Lane Drive (Ord. 109-2025, 110-2025, and 111-2025).

Toledo Edison's engineer group has completed their engineering design work based on the relocation plans prepared by the City and has formulated a Billing Proposal in the amount of \$426,129.17. The Service Department has received the authorization to proceed from the Federal Highway Administration and the Ohio Department of Transportation to publicly advertise and bid the above referenced project.

As a reminder this project will replace four (4) Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacon (RRFB) systems at Highland Elementary, Sylvan Elementary, McCord Junior High, and Southview High School with Pedestrian Hybrid Beacons (PHB). The estimated construction cost is \$731,103.00 of which \$657,992.70 (90%) is being funded by the Ohio Department of Transportation Systemic Safety Program.

This project, and the ongoing Main Street/Monroe Street/Summit Street Traffic Signal Improvements Project current under construction, are jointly funded with Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) grant funding assistance. The total combined project cost is \$1,505,779 of which \$762,470 (51%) is to be funded by ODOT and \$293,625 (19%) is to be funded by OPWC. The remaining \$449,684 (30%) is locally funded.

The Service Department would advertise for bids immediately after City Council approval of the 2026 budget with the goal of opening bids prior to Christmas and recommending a project award in January 2026. Construction would begin in the spring of 2026 and be completed by the end of the year.

The City applied for \$468,734 in Ohio Public Works Commission (OPWC) funding assistance in 2023 for the Harroun Road/Ravine Drive Intersection Improvements Project and was successful. The application filed was a grant/loan structure with \$222,649 (47.5%) to be reimbursed by grant and the remaining \$246,085 (52.5%) was to be a 10-year, 0% interest loan.

Construction work on the project is approximately 80% complete and the City is ready to begin the reimbursement process with OPWC for construction-related expenses. Before construction reimbursements can be submitted OPWC is requiring the City to adopt a Resolution of Intent (ROI) which declares the City's intent to borrow and reimburse a portion of the awarded funds.

The ROI allows OPWC to comply with federal regulations pertaining to the proceeds of tax-exempt debt from the state of Ohio, which funds the loan. These regulations only apply to the construction-related expenses on the project and do not apply to any reimbursable costs from engineering or right-of-way phases of the project.






